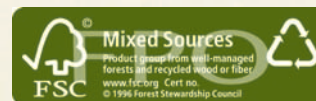

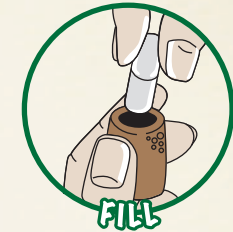

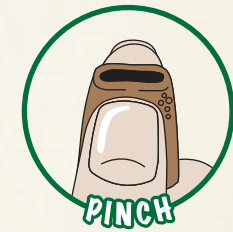

Medicine that's easy to swallow

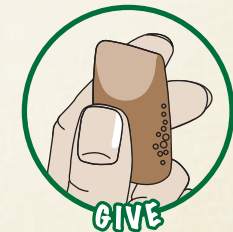
