



How to Clean Your Dog's Teeth: 7 Methods That Work



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Keeping your canine best friend's teeth sparkling is more than just a beauty routine. It's essential for their health! Knowing how to clean your dog's teeth effectively can help prevent plaque buildup, bad breath, and more serious dental issues.

In this guide, we discuss the most effective methods for keeping your dog's teeth clean, warning signs that indicate your dog's dental health needs attention, and how to build a dental routine that works.

7. Professional cleanings help remove tartar below the gumline. The frequency of these visits depends on your dog's oral health.

Why Dental Care for Dogs Matters



Your dog's oral care routine is [vital](#) because most dogs show signs of dental disease by age three.

What causes dental disease? When food particles stay on your dog's teeth, they form plaque, which can harden into stubborn tartar within just a few days. That tartar can lead to gum inflammation and bacteria buildup.

If ignored, these bacteria can cause infections that can spread to the bloodstream and throughout your dog's body, where they can damage their heart, liver, and kidneys. Regular dental care is the best way to help your canine best friend live a healthier life.

7 Ways to Clean Your Dog's Teeth

1) Brush Your Dog's Teeth

Daily brushing is the best and most effective way to remove plaque and stop tartar in its tracks. Just be sure to always use toothpaste made for dogs, as the human version can be toxic for your canine best friend.

How to Introduce Tooth Brushing

Introducing your dog to tooth brushing is a gradual process that can take around two weeks. Start by letting your dog taste the toothpaste. When they're comfortable with that, gently rub their teeth at the gumline with your finger to build trust. Gradually move to a soft dog toothbrush, child-sized brush, or finger brush.

Keep these [sessions](#) short, and reward your dog for staying calm. With patience and

consistency, they'll get used to the routine, and it will become a stress-free part of your day.

2) Give Dental Treats

Dental treats are a delicious way to help fight plaque, tartar, and [bad breath](#) while your dog snacks. Their texture scrapes away plaque and cleans teeth as your dog bites down.

When shopping for dental treats, look for the Veterinary Oral Health Care (VOHC) Seal of Acceptance, which proves that the product actually works to remove plaque and tartar. Then follow the package directions to avoid overfeeding and extra calories.

Keep in mind that dental treats are best used *in addition to* regular brushing and professional cleanings, not as a replacement for them.

3) Feed Dental Care Dog Food

Another way to help keep your dog's teeth clean is to feed them dental care dog food. These special recipes are formulated with a unique kibble texture that cleans teeth as your dog chews.

How does it do that?

Unlike regular kibble that crumbles easily, many dental care dog foods feature larger pieces designed to withstand the puncture of the tooth. Every time your dog bites down, the kibble scrapes plaque and tartar off their teeth.

Some of these dog foods carry the VOHC Seal for proven effectiveness, but always consult a veterinarian before switching your dog's primary diet.

4) Use Water Additives

If getting their teeth brushed isn't your dog's favorite thing, water additives might be your new best friend. These liquid solutions are designed to fight bacteria and [freshen breath](#) with very little effort on your part.

Simply add a small amount of the additives to your dog's water bowl every day according to the package instructions. If you choose this option, look for high-quality brands that don't contain alcohol or xylitol so they're safe for daily consumption.

Just keep in mind that water additives aren't a total replacement for scrubbing. They're a

great way to help keep your dog's mouth clean and fresh between brushings. Consult your veterinarian for more information and for product recommendations.

5) Provide Chew Toys

Chewing is a natural instinct for your dog, and the right toy can turn that instinct into a fun, easy teeth-cleaning session.

Durable rubber chew toys scrub your dog's teeth when they bite down. That mechanical scrubbing helps remove surface plaque and prevent tartar from forming. This keeps teeth smooth and gums healthy.

Always supervise your dog to make sure they don't swallow any pieces. And avoid extremely hard items like real bones or antlers that can shatter (and become a choking hazard) or cause painful tooth fractures.

Stick to hard-yet-flexible, dog-safe materials that give your dog's jaw a workout and [keep their mouth healthy](#).

6) Try Dental Wipes

For dogs that aren't fond of the toothbrush (no matter how much you work with them), dental wipes may be the solution.

These textured pads allow you to manually remove surface plaque simply by wrapping a wipe around your finger and rubbing it on the outside of your dog's teeth.

While dental wipes are great for cleaning the flat surfaces of the teeth, they can't reach the tiny crevices on and between teeth as well as a toothbrush can. Still, they're an effective way to clean your dog's mouth in-between more thorough brushings and professional cleanings.

7) Schedule Professional Cleanings

Even with the best home care, your dog still needs a professional cleaning to keep their teeth, gums, and mouth healthy.

These [cleanings](#) involve scaling and polishing your dog's teeth to remove tartar that builds up under the gumline where brushes and other dental solutions can't reach. Your veterinarian will also perform a full oral exam to catch any hidden issues before they become major problems.

Most dogs benefit from a professional visit every 6 to 12 months, depending on their breed, age, and at-home care routine.

Dental Cleaning Methods Comparison



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To give your dog the best dental care possible, it’s important to understand that not all cleaning methods provide the same level of prevention and protection.

Some are perfect for daily maintenance, while others are necessary for deep cleaning. Use the table below to compare the options and build a custom routine that fits your lifestyle and your dog’s personality.

Method	Effectiveness	Best For	Limitations
Brushing	High	Daily plaque prevention	Requires training; does not remove tartar
Dental Treats	Moderate	Dogs who resist brushing	Does not clean below gumline
Dental care dog food	Moderate	Daily maintenance through feeding	Must be fed dry
Water Additives	Low to Moderate	Supplementing other methods	Not effective alone
Chew Toys	Low to Moderate	Mechanical cleaning during play	Does not replace brushing
Dental Wipes	Moderate	Dogs resistant to brushing	Cannot reach between teeth
Professional Cleaning	Very High	Tartar removal and oral exam	Requires anesthesia; periodic visits

Note: A combination of daily at-home care and regular veterinary cleanings provides the best protection against dental disease. Consult your veterinarian for personalized recommendations.

Signs Your Dog Needs Dental Attention

Your dog’s mouth and teeth get a lot of use every day, so it’s important to keep a close eye on their dental health between veterinary visits.

Common signs of trouble include persistent [bad breath](#); yellow or brown tartar buildup on

teeth; red, swollen, or bleeding gums; difficulty eating or chewing; and repetitive pawing at their mouth.

Other signs that your dog may require a veterinarian's attention include:

- Loose or missing teeth
- Drooling more than usual
- Reluctance to play with toys
- Changes in eating habits or weight loss

If you notice any of these signs, schedule a veterinary dental exam right away.

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Frequently Asked Questions

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1. How often should I brush my dog's teeth?

Brushing your dog's teeth is important for preventing plaque and tartar buildup. If daily brushing isn't an option, aim for at three to four times a week.

Since plaque hardens into tartar in just a few days, consistency is key. Even a quick scrub with a brush or your finger is better than nothing!

2. **How often should I give my dog dental treats?**

Most dental treats, including GREENIES™ treats, are designed for once-daily use, but always follow the instructions on the package for the correct amount based on the size and weight of your dog.

It's also important to keep in mind that treats should only make up about 10% of your dog's daily calories. Similarly, dental treats are only a supplement for brushing and should not replace it.

3. **Is it too late to start brushing an older dog's teeth?**

It's never too late to start a dental care routine! Older dogs might need a professional cleaning first to clear away old tartar, but once their mouth is clean, daily brushing will help keep plaque and tartar away so they can enjoy their old age.

As you would with any other dog, introduce brushing gradually with patience and positive reinforcement. And, whether your dog is [old](#) or young, consult your veterinarian if your canine friend has significant tartar buildup on their teeth.

4. **What happens during a veterinary dental exam?**

During a dental exam, the veterinarian administers anesthesia to sedate your dog so that they can perform a full oral exam with a deep clean.

Often, this includes X-rays to see beneath the gumline, scaling to remove tartar, and polishing the enamel. Additional treatment may be recommended based on what your veterinarian finds during the exam.

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
